Letter from Our Executive Director

For the first 46 years of our existence, Mothers' Club Family Learning Center made the best use of whatever space was available. Our previous shared location at the Orange Grove Friends Meeting House was less than optimal; but our stalwarts, my predecessors, made it work. Using all available space, they hosted parenting workshops in the kitchen, held a toddler class in an outdoor play area, and shared limited office space.

I had the privilege of joining Mothers' Club after we moved into our permanent facility in 2007. Thanks to the generosity of our dedicated supporters and the hard work of our steadfast Board and staff, we now call this beautiful, state-of-the art, sustainable building home.

Located right in the middle of Northwest Pasadena, we are perfectly positioned to serve families with the highest needs in our community. And the needs are great – recent reports have identified Pasadena as a city with one of the greatest wealth discrepancies in the state of California. You can take a look at a comparison of demographics for our city on the following pages.

Since moving into our center on North Fair Oaks, we have been working to expand our services to utilize all available time and space while meeting the growing needs of our community. With the opening of our Afternoon Three-Year-Old classroom this year, all five of our Early Childhood Education classrooms are filled during both the morning and afternoon sessions. Our core Two-Generation Learning Program is now operating at maximum capacity.

Programs & Activities

Mothers' Club Family Learning Center prepares families living in isolation and poverty to succeed in school and in life through two-generation learning programs. We fulfill our mission by providing free programs to disadvantaged families with children ages 0-5.

Our core Two-Generation Learning Program consists of both a Morning Session and an Afternoon Session. Our Morning Session currently serves 67 children and their parents and our Afternoon Session serves 56 children and their parents. Both sessions contain the following components: Early Childhood Education, Parent Education, Adult Education, Mental Health Support, and Leadership Training.





In addition, we partner with Learning Works!, a Pasadena Charter School for disenfranchised youth, to provide a weekly **Teen Parenting Program** on Thursday afternoons. Teen parents who are students at Learning Works! come to Mothers' Club for parenting classes intended to prepare them to meet the challenges of parenting and develop an understanding of their individual responsibility as parents.

One Saturday morning a month, we offer our **Early Readers' Book Club**. The unique program is designed to inspire a love of reading in preschool children and strengthen the literacy skills of English-learning parents. English-speaking volunteers read books aloud to children and families and lead interactive literacy activities. Through peer-to-peer modeling, parents become more comfortable with listening to and reading aloud in English.

We have recently implemented a **Fathers' Support Group** to involve the men of our families in Mothers' Club programming. The group meets for an hour and a half on Thursday evenings for seven-week sessions. Each week focuses on a different parenting topic and fathers participate in group discussion led by our experienced parent educator.

Our Community


Mothers' Club Family Learning Center is located in the center of **Northwest Pasadena** – an often overlooked region within the city of Pasadena located above the 210 freeway. Despite being embedded in the diverse, wealthy, and well-educated city of Pasadena, Northwest Pasadena is plagued by poverty, illiteracy, and low-educational attainment.

Recent studies have observed that Pasadena has become a city characterized by a widening income gulf, low wages, and high rents. The average income of Pasadena's richest 20 percent of households is 22.4 times greater than the average income of the poorest 20 percent. Based on this measure, Pasadena trails only San Francisco as the California city with the biggest inequality gap.

The following data depict the widening differences between the city of Pasadena as a whole and the region known as Northwest Pasadena. Mothers' Club is working every day to address the inequality and provide all families in Pasadena with the chance to improve their lives.


According to the 2008-2012 American Community Survey, families in Northwest Pasadena exhibit the following characteristics:

- 33% of adults 25 years and older do not have high school diplomas and 22% have less than a 9th grade education;
- 22% of families with children under 5 years old live below the federal poverty level;
- 28% of households have an annual income of less than \$25,000;
- **58**% of the population over 5 years old speaks a language other than English at home.




Northwest Pasadena

2014 Accomplishments

National Recognition:

We are pleased to announce that our partnership with Pacific Clinics Early Head Start was chosen by the National Head Start Association (NHSA) as a featured program of the Two Generations Together Initiative. We will gain national recognition when we present alongside Pacific Clinics Early Head Start at the Two Generations Together Institute at NHSA's 2015 Winter Leadership Institute. As the importance of Early Childhood Education and parent engagement begins to take center-stage in a national dialogue, we look forward to sharing our two-generation learning model and lending our voice to this critical conversation.

2014 Outcomes:

Across our programs, children and parents met or exceeded their learning benchmarks, demonstrating children's readiness for school and parents' ability to support their children's education, as well as their own personal development.

100%

of infants and toddlers demonstrated appropriate developmental growth

97%

of PreK children entering Kindergarten possessed school readiness skills

72%

of adult learners showed gains in their English reading skills

92%

of parents took on a leadership role at Mothers' Club

83%

of parents increased their understanding of appropriate parenting practices

95%

of parents reported reading to their children 3 or more times per week




