As we look towards the future, we see a Mothers' Club that will continue to bring knowledge, skills and hope to families through our proven two-generation learning model. But, we do not do this alone! The support that Mothers' Club receives from the community at-large continues to grow, not only in dollars, but also in time and energy that our incredible volunteers give to our families. Some highlights from 2011 include;

- Almost 500 volunteers dedicated close to 3,300 service hours at our center
- 280 individuals gave for the very first time to Mothers' Club
- 123 Children, 98 Parents, and 25 adult learners from the community benefitted from our services
- Mothers' Club was named Non-Profit of the Year by the Pasadena Star News/Rose Magazine

These accomplishments were possible because we are anchored in our core values: Two-Generation Learning, Empowerment, Respect, Welcoming Environment, and Quality Improvement. And, with our talented and dedicated staff, board leadership, community support and our state of the art facility, we are positioned to be more innovative in our program design and outreach to the community with the purpose of having greater impact on families in need.

2011 Program Accomplishments...

The *MISSION* of Mothers' Club Family Learning Center is to prepare families living in isolation and poverty to succeed in school and in life through two-generation learning programs. We fulfill our mission by providing FREE programs to disadvantaged families with children ages 0-5.

In all programs, mothers and children are enrolled in their own programming, gaining the knowledge and skills they will need to break out of poverty.

All of our programs uphold our **TWO-GENERATION LEARNING APPROACH** and consist of the following core elements:

- Early Childhood Education
- Parent Education
- Adult Education
- English as a Second Language
- Parent/Child Interactive Literacy Activities
- Family Literacy Classes
- Health & Nutrition Classes
- Mental Health Services

Our **Family Literacy** program served 62 parents with 76 children from 6 weeks to 5 years old. The program was offered Monday-Friday from 8:30am - 12pm for 11 months.

First Connections served a total of 23 parents with 32 infants and toddlers in 2011, and was offered Monday-Friday from 1:00- 4:30pm throughout the year.

Our **Teen Parenting** program served 13 teen moms and 15 children last year. This class was offered weekly for 90 minutes.

Volunteer Programs

Three years ago, Mothers' Club set out to formalize our volunteer program and create new opportunities for the community to engage in our work. In 2011, close to 500 student and adult volunteers logged more than 3,300 hours of service at our center.

Volunteer activities included: Early Readers Book Club, Parent Literacy Pen Pal Program, Corporate Team Building Projects, Activity Engineers, and Teacher Assistants

2010 Outcomes






Statement of Activities

A Mother's Story

My name is Ana and I have two small children; Angel who is 2 years old and Fernando who is 11 months old. I came to the United States when I was just 23 years old, looking for independence and a different life. What I found was fears, tears, compassion and then happiness. And through the program at Mothers' Club, I have now found hope.

I finished high school in Mexico and was working for as a secretary in a school. I felt a lot of pressure from my family. As a single woman, any problem with the family - financial, medical, or emotional - was my problem since I had "no other responsibilities". My family was depending on me for so much, but they were not respecting me. I could not bear disappointing them, so I decided to come to the United States and join my sister. It was the only way to say "stop" without hurting everyone.

I left my family, my job, my city and everything that was secure. I knew coming to a new life would be difficult but I never imagined how difficult it would be emotionally. When you come as an immigrant you begin to change and the changes are not because of new things, they are from fear. A fear that I did not even know was there.

In Mexico, I was an independent person, but now walking outside of the apartment was overwhelming. There was a fear of people, if they talked to me. What if I took a wrong turn on the street, how could I get back? Who would I ask for help and could I trust them? Was I going to be hurt, was someone going to rob me?

These fears affect your mind, body and soul. You feel insecure because now you can't rely on your own abilities and have to be taken care of by someone else. You feel stupid because all the skills you have do not help you anymore. And you feel alone because hope slowly starts

going away; hope for the future and for yourself.

I was never a person that felt sorry for myself, so after a couple of months of feeling depressed and lonely I decided to try. I forced myself to look for a job. After a long time I finally got a job with a cleaning crew. When you don't know language you choose things you can do with your hands. The manager would pick us up in El Monte and drop us of at a building in the evening to clean. Sometimes, they would leave us there all night without notice. One time, I remember being left for 12 hours. We were so hungry; we started to look through the trash for food. I never imagined that I would ever be in this situation. This experience added to my depression and my loneliness. I knew I was going down fast so I wanted to change.

I noticed the people that worked in the buildings we cleaned - some of the bank tellers or secretaries. They could speak some English, but still had heavy accents. They were treated much better than me. I told myself I could be like them. So I decided to learn English to get a better job. In the next few years I did get better jobs but I was still struggling to learn English and felt discriminated in the jobs I was able to get.

During this time, I met my wonderful husband and we had two beautiful children. I had to stop working and my husband had a hard time finding work. With two young children and not a good income, we were feeling very stressed. I did not know what to do with the children to keep them busy and help them learn. We all needed to improve our skills, and my family needed a focus.

In the neighborhood I heard about a program that helped families. After waiting for one year I was able to enter Mothers' Club. At Mothers' Club I have found a focus for my family - a routine. Even on weekends we talk about getting ready to come to school. The kids take bathes, we go to sleep early and we wake up looking forward to school. I am thrilled to be studying English three days a week. And

my children are very happy. I know that they will have a better future because of the education they are getting at Mothers' Club.

Even my husband is learning. He comes to school every day and spends ½ hour in the classroom with Angel. He watches and listens to the teachers. He used to treat our boys like a sergeant, yelling orders but now he is different. He learned from the teachers, that kids need patience and encouragement. Now, if I'm frustrated with the boys he sends *me* to time out in my room and he handles the boys himself. I feel that he is more like a partner now and I know this is because of Mothers' Club.

My whole family is learning. We see a bright future for our children, and for us. I have friends, a safe place to learn and I feel happy. That fear that made me lonely, stupid and scared is almost gone. I have faith that we will move forward. I thank the donors like you, for helping to keep Mothers' Club around for families like mine.
